You can imagine how quickly publicity value can accumulate just from those two examples. The Lufkin Club was also able to mention the sponsor of the BrainMinders coloring books, Swain and Baldwin Insurance agency. Now, that is great PR.!

If your club doesn't have a relationship with a local newspaper, radio, or television station, now is a great time to start cultivating one.

When your club receives publicity, send a clipping to your PI Headquarters. As this article was headed to press, we received a link to an article in the *Dallas Press* about the Pilot Club of North Dallas and their BrainMinders presentations. The Dallas ad rate is rounded to \$70 per column inch, and from the on-line version we estimated the article at approximately 20 column inches, so they received about \$140 in free publicity. Congratulations to the North Dallas Club—we hope your good public relationships continue to pay off!



We love to see our Pilot Clubs having fun with BrainMinders! There are so many ways we will be able to expand the program to Alzheimer's, St. Jude and brain-related disorders. The **Pilot Club of Enterprise** hosted their 51st Annual Civic Night, which traditionally recognizes the Man, Woman, and Youth of the Year who gave of their time to help others in their community. This year it was dedicated to the eight Enterprise High School students (including Anchors Katie Strunk and Jamie Vidensek) who lost their lives in the tornado in March.

The **Pilot Club of Mobile** recently presented a \$650 check to the Mobile Association for the blind for assistance with their daily operations.

COED

The **Pilot Club of Singapore** visited Apex Harmony Lodge in August for monthly hair cuts for the residents. When club members arrived at the Home, a group of more than fifty wheel-chaired residents were already there waiting eagerly. They waved and cheered like fans welcoming visiting celebrities. They always appreciate contact with the outside world and a human touch.

Florida

The **Pilot Club of West Volusia** offered free bicycle helmets to the children of Blue Lake Elementary School, and with the help of the school's guidance counselor, gave away 90 helmets. Next they gave helmets to 80 more students at Stetson Bible School in the summer.

Georgia

The **Pilot Club of Milledgeville** was profiled in the local newspaper, *The Union-Recorder*, in a series on the service organizations in the community. The article mentioned the club's main fundraiser, its Light-A-Light program during the holiday season,

and its most popular annual service project, the Child Car Seat Safety Check, held every fall.

Kentucky-Ohio-West Virginia

The **Pilot Club of Akron's BrainMinder Buddies** participated in the Pro Football Hall of Fame Community Parade on July 29. The children viewing the parade enjoyed the characters and reading the signs about how to protect their brains for life.

North Carolina

The **Pilot Club of Laurinburg** sponsored a Spring Flower Sale, an annual fundraiser. They sold out, as usual. Proceeds go toward a \$1,000 donation to the Autism Summer Program. The club also held its annual Awards Night, and decided to give a Community Service Award instead of a Professional Woman of the Year, as it had in the past. The top award was presented to Essie Davis for her work with persons with autism, including serving as coordinator of the Autism Summer Program.

The **South Brunswick Island Pilot Club, North Carolina**, applied for and received grants from local organizations, including \$2,500 from Brunswick Electric Membership Corporation, to expand Brunswick County's Project Lifesaver program. The club had already received a PIF matching grant to bring Project Lifesaver to their community—this one will allow the sheriff's department to purchase more equipment.

The **Pilot Club of Harrisonburg, Virginia**, received a \$500 grant from the Virginia Department of Health to purchase bicycle helmets for low-income school-age children. The club also held two Bicycle Safety Days at area churches.

Club Operations

Now that we have returned from convention in Norfolk full of Pilot spirit, renewed friendships, being inspired by all the speakers and workshops, it is time to channel that energy into club operations where our goal is to increase the membership in our wonderful organization. We need to share that wonderful Pilot feeling. But how do you do that? Who do you share with? When do you do this?

Lets start with Who? Everyone you come in contact with—family, friends, fellow workers, neighbors, and don't forget the people at the bank, grocery store, beauty shop, gas station and the school where your kids or grandkids go. Never rule anyone out—the person you think is too busy, won't like it or some other reason, may turn out to be one of your best members. What about the guest speakers at your meeting, teachers and staff when you are giving a Brainminders presentation, parents at the scout meeting, customers at your bake or garage sale?

The Pilot's job is to teach leadership skills, and be active in their clubs, as well as having them interact with Pilots. Sad to say, but some Anchor Clubs don't know their sponsoring Pilot Club.

Once you've answered this first question and are convinced your club has what it takes, you are ready to move forward. When you get to that point feel free to contact me or Laura Adams at PI and we will help you every step of the way.

It has been said again and again: Anchors are our future. To ensure our future we must continue to start new Anchor Clubs. A recent innovation, we now have clubs in the elementary and middle schools. This is new territory and very exciting. The two young ladies, both age eleven, who attended convention this year are a testament to the fact that even at their young age, they understand the importance of community service. What Anchors are able to do at the different age levels will differ, but it will teach responsibility and leadership all the same.

Projects

Let's start off this Pilot year with some wildly successful service projects. To help you to reach that goal, here are "10 Steps Toward Performing a Successful Community Service Project." Use this as your planning guide:

1. Determine what is needed in your community. Ask club members, ask other community groups, talk with community officials, and find out what types of projects have and have not been done in the recent past.
2. Determine what types of activities your members have interest in and abilities to do. Consider the size of your club and ages of members. Consider the skills possessed by your club members. Determine how much time your club would like to devote to community service activities. (Would members rather do a long-term, ongoing project or several short-term one-time activities?)

3. List all of the activities that have been suggested.
4. Ask your club to rank the activities in order of importance and interest, based on what was considered in steps 1 and 2. Reach consensus or use a vote by majority rule to determine the activity your club will do.
5. Document your club's efforts with photos, videotape, or written notes (and after the fact, send some of that great information in to the Log!)
6. As you work on this project, monitor activities taking place and make adjustments as needed. Especially after the project has been completed, allow time for your club to discuss the successes and shortcomings of the project and ideas for improvement.
7. Develop a summary report of your project. Share it with the media. A scrapbook is a nice way to present the project's success.
8. Feel good about your club's contribution to the community. And always remember "MAKE IT FUN!"

Fundraising

At the 2007 Pilot International Convention in Norfolk, the Funds Flying High workshop was filled with Pilots eager to learn about ways to get started with their fundraising activities. A special thanks to Vicky Broussard, 2006-2007 Fundraising Coordinator, for gathering the information presented in the fundraising workshop. Thanks to all of the participants for making the workshop a success.

Several Pilots have asked about the information presented in the workshop, so here's a quick overview of the key points from the workshop:

First, appoint a fundraising coordinator. Choose someone with good personal and organizational skills. The coordinator's role is to define the targets and goals and turn ideas into action with a practical plan of campaign. The coordinator must also find the right people with all sorts of skills and persuade them to join the fundraising team.

Second, gather a Fundraising Committee. The coordinator needs to organize the committee so they can work together using their different talents and abilities to the fullest. There are several roles that need to be filled to make a successful fundraiser:

- **Publicity:** get the word out through the local media and by word-of-mouth.
- **Financial:** handle the funds and have a clear view of costs and potential income;
- **Acquisitions:** approach anybody and everybody about the fundraiser to request donations such as door and raffle prizes, etc.;
- **Culinary:** come up with refreshments that will get the event rolling and generate more funds; and

- **Logistics:** distribute flyers, set up, play the background music, and clean up.

Third, set your targets and goals. Listed below are steps to take to execute the project:

- **Plan the details** of your event and set a fundraising goal;
- **Set a date**—coordinate with other events in the community;
- **Make a list** of equipment needed and possible sources;
- **For outdoor events**, check for weather conditions;
- **Keep in mind other opportunities** to raise cash, such as corporate or individual donations,
- **Begin advertising** as soon as you set the date for the event,
- **Finally, plan on an achievable schedule**—and stick to it so everyone knows where and when to show up.

I am asking all clubs throughout Pilot International to send details of fundraisers so I can share them with everyone—I'll list them in the *Log* and develop a resource guide to aid clubs in planning for the future. Please e-mail me at musesaltersa@hotmail.com and include the following information for each project:

- Club name and district
- Contact information—name, e-mail, phone numbers, etc.
- Name and description of fundraiser—include the who, what, when, where and how.
- Goals and target groups to benefit from the fundraiser.
- Budget—itemize costs.
- Total expense—itemize, if possible.
- Net profit.

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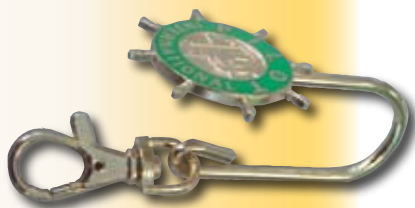
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
